

Annual Security & Fire Safety Report

The 2015 Annual Security and Fire Safety Report is available. Southern Illinois University Carbondale (SIU) prepares the Annual Security and Fire Safety Report (ASR) in compliance with the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act ("Clery Act") and the State of Illinois Campus Security Enhancement Act. The Clery Act requires colleges and universities to:

- 1. Publish an annual security and fire safety report;
- 2. Disclose crime statistics;
- 3. Provide timely warning and emergency notifications upon the confirmation of a significant emergency or dangerous situation involving an immediate threat to the health or safety of students or employees occurring on campus;
- 4. Disclose missing student notification procedures for residents living on campus;
- 5. Provide a 60 day crime and fire log;
- 6. Submit collected crime and fire statistics to the U.S. Department of Education.

CAMPUS SECURITY AUTHORITY RESPONSIBILITIES

As part of the federal Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act, otherwise known as the Clery Act, certain categories of crime, arrest and referrals at certain locations are required to be reported in an Annual Security Report. The report can be found here.

Another key requirement of the Clery Act is to identify Campus Security Authorities (CSAs) to assist with resources, reporting, and overall safety of the campus community.

What is a Campus Security Authority (CSA)?

The Clery Act identifies certain categories of students, University employees and contractors as CSAs. These individuals are identified as CSAs based on the function of their job and whether or not they have a significant responsibility for student activates or the ability to control access to facilities.

The intent of including non-law enforcement personnel in the role of CSA is to acknowledge that some community members and students in particular may be hesitant about reporting crime to the police, but may be more inclined to report incidents to other campus-affiliated individuals.

Safety Awareness Facts and Reporting Obligations

CSAs are responsible for reporting allegations of Clery Act crimes and must also report any Clery Act crimes reported to them or that they witness. A Clery Act crime is considered "reported" when it is brought to the attention of a CSA, University Police or local law enforcement personnel by a victim, witness, other third party or even the offender.

While CSAs are only obligated to report <u>Clery Act crimes</u> that occurred within the University's Clery <u>Geography</u>, CSAs are encouraged to promptly report **all** campus- related criminal incidents.


Most people understand that domestic violence occurs by many different methods. While the abuse may be physical, sexual, or emotional, domestic violence is never okay, nor is it the victim's fault. There are three cycles of violence: the tension phase, the violent phase, and the honeymoon phase. The chart below gives detailed explanations of each phase. If you, a loved one, or an acquaintance experiences the symptoms listed below, it is time to get help. Stand up for yourself and others to help end domestic violence!

Does your partner:

- * Embarrass or put you down?
- * Look at you or act in ways to scare you?
- * Control what you do, who you see or talk to, or where you go?
- * Stop you from seeing friends or family members?
- * Take your money or refuse to give you money?
- * Make all the decisions?
- * Threaten to take away your children?
- * Threaten to commit suicide?
- * Prevent you from working or going to school?
- * Act like abuse is your fault?
- * Destroy your property?
- * Threaten your pets?
- * Threaten you with weapons?
- * Shove, slap, choke, or hit you?
- * Threaten to kill you?

"Honeymoon" Phase

The abuser could ignore, deny, or act sorry for the violence. The abuser may try to "make up" through gifts or favors. The abuser may seek pity. This phase is an attempt to draw you back into the relationship.



Violent Phase

This is the actual violent episode. It includes physical, emotional, or sexual abuse. A crime is committed.

Tension Phase

This feels like walking on eggshells. There may not be physical violence, but emotional abuse, threats, and intimidation are present. Fear of violence is often as coercive as violence itself.
